April Unemployment Rates Decline Seasonally in All of Michigan's Regional Labor Markets

Lansing – Seasonally unadjusted unemployment rates in April moved downward in all of the state's 17 major labor market areas, according to the Michigan Department of Technology, Management & Budget. Total employment levels increased in most regions over the month, while labor force levels were mixed.

"Payroll jobs rose and jobless rates fell throughout the state in April 2016," said Jason Palmer, director of the Bureau of Labor Market Information & Strategic Initiatives. "These were typical seasonal trends for the month of April."

From March to April, the seasonal jobless rate reductions in the 17 areas ranged from -0.3 to -1.9 percentage points with a median decline of -0.7 of a percentage point. The largest rate drops were posted in the Northeast and Northwest Lower Michigan regions, with decreases of -1.9 and -1.2 percentage points respectively. The next largest monthly rate decrease was recorded the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) (-1.1 percentage points). In April, 12 of Michigan's 17 major regions displayed unemployment rates below the national non-seasonally adjusted rate of 4.7 percent. All major regions in the state registered rates in April of 7.5 percent or below.

Unemployment Rates Fall Over Year

Since April 2015, jobless rates declined in all of the state's major labor markets. Reductions over the year ranged from -0.4 to -1.0 percentage points with a median decrease of -0.6 of a percentage point. The largest drop over this period was recorded in the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSA (-1.0). Five other areas posted declines of -0.8 of a percentage point since April 2015.

Total Employment Up Over Month, Year

From March to April, total employment rose in 15 of the 17 regions in the state. Over-the-month gains ranged from 0.2 to 1.9 percent with a median hike of 0.8 percent. The most pronounced April total employment increases occurred in the Northeast Lower Michigan region (+1.9%), and the Niles-Benton Harbor MSA (+1.4%). The Northwest Lower Michigan region along with the Muskegon and Lansing-East Lansing MSAs also showed significant gains of 0.9 percent each over the month. Total employment fell slightly in April by -0.2 percent in both the Detroit-Warren-Livonia MSA and the Upper Peninsula.

Since April 2015, total employment advanced in 16 of the 17 regions. Most gains were significant, with a median hike of 2.7 percent. The largest over-the-year total employment increases were recorded in the Ann Arbor and Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSAs. Total employment edged down slightly by -0.1 percent in the Jackson MSA since April 2015.

Labor Force Levels Mixed Over Month, Up Over Year

During April, workforce levels declined in nine regions and increased in eight. Most over-the-month labor force changes were minor, with a median decline of -0.4 percent and median advance of 0.4 percent. The largest reductions were posted in the Detroit-Warren-Livonia MSA (-1.3%), and the Upper Peninsula (-1.1%). The biggest over-the-month workforce gains were registered in the Niles-Benton Harbor MSA (0.8%), and the Ann Arbor MSA (0.6%).

Since April 2015, labor force levels advanced in 16 areas with a very solid median gain of 1.9 percent. The Jackson MSA posted the only over-the-year workforce reduction (-0.7%).

Seasonal Job Gains in Four Sectors Push Overall Jobs Upward in April

The monthly survey of employers indicated that seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs in Michigan increased by 36,000 or 0.9 percent in April to 4,307,000. A number of industry sector job additions were seasonal, and were led by over-the-month increases in professional and business services (+9,000), leisure and hospitality services (+8,000), construction (+7,000), and trade, transportation and utilities (+5,000). Other notable gains in April were posted in education and health services and in manufacturing, both adding 4,000 jobs in April. The only April job reduction was recorded in government (-2,000).

From March to April, payroll jobs rose in all of the state's 14 metropolitan regions, with gains ranging from 0.5 to 1.8 percent, for a 0.9 percent median hike. The Niles-Benton Harbor (1.8%), Muskegon (1.7%), Lansing-East Lansing (+1.3%), and Midland (+1.3%) MSAs registered the largest percentage gains in April.

From April 2015 to April 2016, seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs rose statewide by 98,000 or 2.3 percent. Nearly all major sectors in the state posted job increases over this period, with the largest numerical upward movement recorded in professional and business services (+23,000), manufacturing (+20,000), education and health services (+16,000) and leisure and hospitality services (+13,000).

Since April 2015, payroll jobs rose in 12 of the 14 metropolitan regions of the state, with a median job gain of 2.4 percent. Metro regions displaying the biggest percentage increases over this period were the Ann Arbor, Monroe, Saginaw, and Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSAs. The Jackson MSA registered a job reduction over the year, while jobs in the Midland MSA were essentially unchanged.

County Jobless Rates Down Over Month, Year

Seventy-eight of Michigan's 83 counties recorded seasonal jobless rate declines over the month, with a median reduction of a full percentage point. Four counties, all in the Upper Peninsula, posted rate hikes, while the rate in Menominee County was unchanged over the month.

Since April 2015, jobless rates declined in 80 counties, with a median reduction of -0.7 of a percentage point. Three counties recorded unemployment rate increases over the year.

*Note: Data in this release is **not seasonally adjusted**. As a result, employment and unemployment trends may differ from previously released Michigan seasonally adjusted data. A breakdown of seasonally unadjusted April workforce estimates for Michigan and its 17 major labor market areas follows, along with a listing of county jobless rates for April.*
