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May Unemployment Rates Edge Upward in Majority of Michigan's Regional Labor Markets

Lansing – Seasonally unadjusted unemployment rates in May increased in 12 of the state's 17 major labor market areas, according to the Michigan Department of Technology, Management & Budget. Total employment and labor force levels advanced in the majority of areas over the month.

"In May, unemployment rates rose in some regions due to a large number of summer and seasonal workers entering the labor market," said Jason Palmer, director of the Bureau of Labor Market Information & Strategic Initiatives. "Although many individuals found employment in May, some were continuing their job search."

From April to May, jobless rates increased in 12 regions and declined in four. The rate in the Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) was unchanged over the month. Rate advances ranged from 0.1 to 1.3 percentage points, but showed a median increase of only 0.2 of a percentage point. The largest unemployment rate increase was posted in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA (+1.3), while the remaining advances were limited to 0.5 of a percentage point or less. Jobless rate reductions in the four regions were mostly significant, with seasonal drops recorded in the Northeast Lower Michigan region (-1.4), the Northwest Lower Michigan region (-0.9), and the Upper Peninsula (-0.9). The Bay City MSA registered a minor over-the-month rate reduction (-0.2). All major regions in the state registered May unemployment rates of 6.0 percent or less.

Unemployment Rates Fall Over Year

Since May 2015, jobless rates declined in all of the state's major labor markets. Reductions over the year ranged from -0.3 to -1.8 percentage points with a solid median decrease of -1.3 percentage points. The largest drops over this period were recorded in the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSA (-1.8) and the Northwest Lower Michigan region (-1.6), while four other areas reported rate reductions of -1.5 percentage points.

Total Employment Up Over Month, Year

From April to May, total employment advanced in 12 of Michigan's 17 major regions. Increases ranged from 0.3 to 4.8 percent, with a median gain of 0.6 percent. The largest over-the-month employment additions by far (on a percentage basis) were seasonal advances in the Northeast and Northwest Lower Michigan regions, with both areas showing a 4.8 percent gain as hiring accelerated for the summer tourism season. The two regions recorded a combined employment gain of around 10,000 in May. The next largest May employment gains were posted in the Muskegon and Detroit-Warren-Livonia MSAs, with additions of 1.2 and 1.1 percent respectively. Four regions registered total employment reductions in May, which included a large drop of -2.1 percent in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA. Total employment was essentially unchanged in the Bay City MSA over the month.

Since May 2015, total employment advanced in 14 of the 17 regions with a significant median gain of 2.3 percent. Total employment declined over the year in the Jackson MSA, while employment was essentially unchanged in the Lansing-East Lansing and Midland MSAs over this period.

Labor Force Levels Up Over Month, Mixed Over Year

During May, workforce levels rose in 11 regions and declined in six. Notable labor force gains were posted in the Northeast and Northwest Lower Michigan regions. Reductions were mostly small with the largest decline of -0.8 percent recorded in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA. Since May 2015, workforce levels were mixed with eight regions showing gains and eight areas recording reductions. The labor force level in the Battle Creek MSA was essentially unchanged over the year. The most pronounced labor force increases over this period were posted in the Ann Arbor and Detroit-Warren-Livonia MSAs, while the largest declines were registered in the Jackson MSA and the Upper Peninsula.

Seasonal and Tourism-Related Hiring Drive Payroll Jobs Upward

The monthly survey of employers indicated that seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs in Michigan increased by 54,000 or 1.3 percent in May to 4,362,000. Job gains in May were mainly seasonal and led by additions in leisure and hospitality services (+22,000), construction (+13,000), professional and business services (+13,000), and trade, transportation and utilities (+12,000). Other job additions in May were posted in education and health services (+3,000) and financial activities (+3,000). May job cuts included a seasonal drop in government (-9,000), reflecting a job decrease in state government education due to the end of the winter/spring semester at a number of the state's universities. Manufacturing jobs fell in May by 3,000 due to short-term layoffs in the auto industry that mainly occurred in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA.

From April to May, payroll jobs rose in 11 of the state's 14 metropolitan regions, with gains ranging from 0.3 to 2.2 percent, for a 1.4 percent median increase. The largest metro area job advances on a percentage basis occurred in the Muskegon (+2.2%) and Niles-Benton Harbor (+1.8%) MSAs. Three metro regions recorded over-the-month job reductions, and were led by a -1.5 percent drop in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA. The Kalamazoo-Portage (-0.2%) and Ann Arbor (-0.1%) MSAs also posted slight job declines in May.

From May 2015 to May 2016, seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs rose statewide by 83,000 or 1.9 percent. Nearly all major sectors in the state posted job increases over this period, with the largest numerical gains revealed in professional and business services (+23,000), education and health services (+15,000), and manufacturing (+10,000). Since May 2015, payroll jobs rose in 11 of the 14 metropolitan regions of the state, with a median job gain of 2.2 percent. Metro regions displaying the biggest percentage increases over this period were the Ann Arbor, Monroe, Saginaw, and Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSAs. The three metro regions registering job losses over the year were the Jackson (-1.3%), Lansing-East Lansing (-0.9%), and Midland (-0.4%) MSAs.

County Jobless Rates Down Over Month, Year

Forty-six of Michigan's 83 counties recorded jobless rate declines over the month, with a median reduction of a full percentage point. Unemployment rates rose slightly in 32 counties in May, showing a minor median hike of 0.2 of a percentage point. The rates in five counties were unchanged in May. Since May 2015, jobless rates declined in 82 counties, with a median reduction of -1.5 percentage points. Eaton County posted a minor over-the-year increase of 0.4 of a percentage point.

*Note: Data in this release is **not seasonally adjusted**. As a result, employment and unemployment trends may differ from previously released Michigan seasonally adjusted data.
