June Unemployment Rates Up Seasonally in All of Michigan's Regional Labor Markets

Lansing – Seasonally unadjusted unemployment rates in June rose seasonally in all of the state's 17 major labor market areas, according to the Michigan Department of Technology, Management & Budget. Total employment and workforce levels advanced in most regions over the month.

"Typical seasonal patterns dominated Michigan's local labor markets in June," said Jason Palmer, director of the Bureau of Labor Market Information & Strategic Initiatives. "However, the majority of Michigan's regional labor markets continue to show improvement so far in 2017, with all of the state's metropolitan regions and 52 of 83 counties displaying June jobless rates of 5.0 percent or below."

Between May and June, the jobless rate increases in the 17 areas were mainly minor, with a median hike of 0.4 of a percentage point. The largest rate advance of a full percentage point was posted in the Lansing-East Lansing Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Six state regions recorded the next largest unemployment rate gain of a half percentage point. The Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSA along with the Northwest Lower Michigan region registered the smallest rate increase of 0.1 of a percentage point. In June, 11 of the state's major areas along with the state (4.0 percent) displayed unemployment rates below the U.S. non-seasonally adjusted rate of 4.5 percent.

Unemployment Rates Down Over Year

Since June 2016, jobless rates fell in 16 regions, while the rate in the Monroe MSA was unchanged over the year. Unemployment rate reductions from June 2016 to June 2017 ranged from -0.1 to -2.0 percentage points with a moderate median decline of -0.6 of a percentage point. The most pronounced rate decreases over this period were recorded in the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSA (-2.0), the Northeast Lower Michigan region (-0.8), and the Upper Peninsula (-0.8).

Total Employment Up Over Month, Year

From May to June, total employment rose in 14 regions and declined in three. Over-the-month employment gains were wide-ranging from 0.1 to 4.1 percent with a median rise of 0.8 percent. The state's three northernmost regions displayed the largest June growth on a percentage basis, with gains posted in the Northwest Lower Michigan region (+4.1%), the Upper Peninsula (+2.2%), and the Northeast Lower Michigan region (+1.8%), as hiring continued for the summer tourism season. These three areas accounted for a combined employment increase of 10,100 over the month. Large seasonal total employment reductions in June were registered in the Lansing-East Lansing MSA (-2.2%), and the Ann Arbor MSA (-1.0%), while the employment count in the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn MSA (-0.2%) edged down slightly over the month.

Since June 2016, total employment increased in ten regions, declined in five areas, and was unchanged in the Monroe MSA and the Northeast Lower Michigan region. The largest percentage gains in employment over this period were reported in the Detroit-Warren-Dearborn (+2.7%), Kalamazoo-Portage (+1.8%), Grand Rapids-Wyoming (+1.4%), and the Lansing-East Lansing

(+1.4%) MSAs. Over-the-year employment reductions were mostly minor with the largest declines recorded in the Bay City MSA (-0.6%) and the Upper Peninsula (-0.5%).

Labor Force Levels Up Over Month, Mixed Over Year

During June, seasonal workforce additions occurred in 14 areas with a significant median gain of 1.3 percent. The state's three northernmost regions posted the largest percentage gains ranging from 2.0 to 4.1 percent, and were followed by notable increases in the Saginaw (+1.9%) and Niles-Benton Harbor (+1.8%) MSAs. Labor force levels declined during June in the Lansing-East Lansing (-1.2%), Ann Arbor (-0.5%), and Detroit-Warren-Dearborn (-0.1%) MSAs. Since June 2016, workforce levels declined in nine areas and rose in eight. Gains and reductions were confined to plus or minus 1.3 percent, with the largest additions posted in the Lansing-East Lansing, Kalamazoo-Portage, and Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSAs. The largest workforce decreases since June 2016 were shown in the Upper Peninsula and the Muskegon MSA.

Seasonal and Tourism-Related Hiring Continue in June

The monthly survey of employers indicated that seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs in Michigan increased by 32,000 or 0.7 percent in May to 4,451,000. Private sector jobs in the state rose by 45,000 or 1.2 percent over the month led by seasonal job gains in *Leisure and hospitality services* (+18,000), *Trade, transportation and utilities* (+11,000), *Construction* (+5,000), and *Professional and business services* (+4,000).

Government jobs fell in June as seasonal cutbacks occurred in State government education (-12,000) and Local government education (-7,000) with the beginning of summer break at area schools and universities. Job cuts in Local government education took place statewide, while job reductions in State government education were most prominent in the Lansing-East Lansing and Ann Arbor MSAs.

In June, payroll jobs rose in 11 of the state's 14 major metropolitan areas. Area job hikes ranged from +0.3 to +2.4 percent with a median gain of +0.9 percent. The Saginaw (+2.4%), Bay City (+1.7%), and Niles-Benton Harbor (+1.7%) metro areas led the over-the-month percentage increases. Jobs in the Midland MSA were unchanged in June, while seasonal job declines were posted in the Lansing-East Lansing (-2.3%) and Ann Arbor (-1.3%) MSAs.

Since June 2016, seasonally unadjusted payroll jobs rose statewide by 83,000 or 1.9 percent. All major industry sectors in Michigan reported over-the-year job gains or were steady. Over this period, payroll jobs rose in 11 of the 14 Michigan metro areas, with regional additions ranging from 0.3 percent to 3.2 percent, while showing a significant median advance of 1.5 percent. The most prominent over-the-year job increases were recorded in the Kalamazoo-Portage (+3.2%), Grand Rapids-Wyoming (+2.3%), and Detroit-Warren-Dearborn (+2.2%) MSAs. The largest over-the-year job reductions were registered in the Muskegon (-0.8%) and Bay City (-0.8%) MSAs.

County Jobless Rates Up Over Month, Down Over Year

Sixty-three of Michigan's 83 counties posted moderate jobless rate advances in June, twelve counties recorded reductions, and eight counties reported no change. Since June 2016, unemployment rates declined in 79 counties, with a median decrease of -0.7 of a percentage point. Jobless rates in Monroe and Ingham counties were unchanged over the year, while the rates in Eaton and Ontonagon counties edged up slightly since June 2016.

Note: Data in this release is **not seasonally adjusted**. As a result, employment and unemployment trends may differ from previously released Michigan seasonally adjusted data.
